



JCHA Campout August 13-15 2010

Chief Paulina (Open to JCHA members and guests)

Chief Paulina Horse camp is located in the Newberry Crater area close to the town of La Pine, OR. This is the only horse campground in this lava flow area and provides the horse enthusiast a great way to site see over the whole monument area. The spurs are large with double or quadruple corrals, 14 sites available. Campers should come prepared. While there is a water pump for the live stock, there is no drinking water. There are two vault toilets. There is no cell phone coverage at the campground, but there are a couple of resorts nearby for supplies and restaurants. There normally is a fee that is charged when you come up to the Newberry Monument area so be aware of that. This is over and above the camping fee to be paid when making a reservation or at the campground. Sites are \$14 (2 h) and \$18 (4h). There is an RV dump station near the entry of Paulina Lake Campground. Additional vehicles are \$7/night/vehicle.

Reservations are required. Each JCHA member is responsible for making your own reservation. Go to: <http://www.recreation.gov/> search for horse sites in Oregon and Chief Paulina. You may make reservations 6 months in advance of the time you plan to arrive. (That means 2nd week in February, reservations will open up, depends on the day you plan to arrive.)
